TEACHING EXPERIENCE 2015-1991

From Fall 2002 through Fall 2015, I taught 87 courses at CSU Fullerton and Chapman University in Orange, California: 36 courses on British literature, 19 on world literature, 20 on criticism, theory, and genre, 8 on American literature, and 4 on composition.
